It is also the main source of information for people wishing to find out about any aspect of the Club's operation, such as membership, fees, bookings and bowling programmes.


Probably many club members have never looked at our website. One feature that stands out is that reading the Club's newsletter on the website is sheer delight. Give it a go!

'Getting Started' Booklet - A Revival Of Sales!

'Getting Started' was compiled in 2015 by Peter Wilson at the request of the late Bill Hodge, who was a truly wonderful coach. He initially provided Peter with many coaching papers, with the request for Peter to put it all together in to a booklet for new bowlers.

Peter searched the web for additional up-to-date suitable material and also consulted with then Bowls NZ Chairperson Cushla McGillivray who referred Peter to the then National Coaching Director Kaushik Patel who provided a lot of material that could be used in the booklet.

So 'Getting Started' was put together and checked by Kaushik and other Bowls NZ staff to make sure it truly reflected current practices in NZ.



A marketing plan was actioned and sales of the booklet were steady throughout the country. After an initial print of 200 copies, two reprints of 100 copies have been made. With stocks getting low, in November 2020 the Board decided to have another reprint of 150 copies and Peter sent out marketing brochures to all Bowling Centres in NZ and all southern bowling clubs..

Bingo! In just over two weeks 19 orders totalling 117 copies have been sold to club's and individual bowlers throughout the country, but mainly in the North Island. As a result, a further reprint may be imminent. This has been a totally unexpected level of sales. Some clubs have just purchased a couple of copies and have said that they may be back to make a bulk order.

Secretary Madeleine is looking sideways at Peter saying that he has created a monster as she deals with all the correspondence re orders and packaging of the booklets - plus almost daily trips to the Post Office. Not to mention Marilyn, who sends out the invoices...Pete, you're in trouble!

As well as being a good fund raiser 'Getting Started' has put the Wanaka Bowling Club very much on the map. All new full members of WBC receive a free copy of 'Getting Started' and that practice continues today.
